Overview from the Chairperson



Eleanor Roosevelt said way back in 1958:

"Universal rights begin in small places close to home. They are the world of the individual person; the neighbourhood he lives in; the school and college he attends; the factory, farm or office he works. Such are the places every man, woman and child seeks equal justice, equal opportunity, equal dignity without discrimination... unless these rights have meaning there, they have little meaning anywhere."

WHERE are these places in our society when it comes to equal rights for everyone, especially the differently abled? Education has the potential to transform the world. But we are hobbled by the lack of quality in our education at every level. With an increase in awareness and some government attention paid to the follow-up to the Right to Education (RTE) Act, now, more than ever before, would have been the best time to implement policies to address the educational needs of differently abled children and adults as well.

Sadly, this has not been a priority for the government. As a result, we lack an overarching policy framework for those with special needs. Policies and actions remain extremely compartmentalised. Their needs are not addressed with everyone else's. Organisations like ours work in islands, with little opportunity for collaboration or support. We continue to persevere, however, and do not stop demanding better from the authorities. Otherwise, how do you explain the fact that out of 200 students enrolled with Vishwas Vidyalaya as many as 40 are with special needs? Just signing or ratifying a protocol like the UN Convention on the Rights of Persons with Disabilities (UNCRPD) or enacting RTE will not help.

The number of students at Vishwas Vidyalaya has been increasing steadily each year. Last year, we informed you that we had applied for recognition as a middle school. This is an ongoing process, and, unfortunately, rather tedious. Hopefully, we should proudly be reporting success to you next year.

Our adult group is looking much more confident too, and they run a self-sustaining eatery, where they do their own shopping, cooking and selling. Vishwas Welfare Haat is a new initiative to this programme. A Job fair was held at Vishwas for adults with disabilities in collaboration with other reputed partners. Our community based programme is making an impact across age groups and in many more villages of Sohna Block.

We are also working in developing an inclusion kit in collaboration with Haryana Education Department and Bharti Foundation. This is to support teachers in adopting inclusive teaching practices so that they can address the needs of all their students, including those with special needs.

This year, our focus was to make Vishwas a stable and sustainable organisation - crucial to our healthy growth. We worked hard to get the status of full-tax exemption on contributions made to Vishwas under Section 35 AC of Income Tax Act. This should help us build a corpus for our future plans. We do hope that our supporters will continue to contribute even more generously in our endeavour to achieve our goals in empowering our children and adults.

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Vishwas Vidyalaya



T was in 2009 that Vishwas embarked on its exciting journey towards inclusive education. The goal was clear: to build a learning environment which was inclusive at its heart. Where all children would have access to meaningful and quality education. Today, Vishwas Vidyalaya isn't just a model in inclusive education, it's also a role model in the field of inclusive education for children with special needs.

Three years down the road, Vishwas Vidyalaya has not only establised itself as an inclusive school but also initiated the process of sharing its success and learning with other stakeholders in the field.

■ Student strength increased from 130 (in March 2012) to 200 (in March 2013) As teachers gained confidence, the student-teacher ratio was increased gradually from 1:22 to 1:32.






■ Classrooms were enriched by a range of volunteers who brought their formidable experience to the students by: value-education sessions by Charu Sharma and Navpreet Garg from *UTTHAN*, English speaking/soft skills by Payal Kapur Sharma (Towards A Special Cause-TASC) and orientation to Braille dots for children with visual difficulties by Neeti Bajaj



- Learning material was upgraded to make it more responsive to the changing needs of students: from introduction of visual timetables in class to the redesigning of workbooks for the foundation as well as the functional skills group and the use of alphabet and number boards to increase participation of children.
- Fourteen students of Vishwas Vidyalaya were enrolled for the basic computer certificate course, twice a week at the NIIT foundationcentre. They successfully completed the course and will begin the advance course in the next term.





■ Vidyalaya also continued with the documentation and follow up required for formal recognition as a private unaided middle school.

Diwali Mela





- We continued our partnership with Volunteer Overseas which was instrumental in strengthening our existing programme. Olwen Pritchard, advisor-CBR programme from the United Kingdom, joined us in July 2012 and spent almost a year with the programme. The staff at Vishwas learnt from her years of experience in leadership and team-building.
- In May 2012, Multi Purpose Health Supervisor Ms. Santosh of Sohna and Auxiliary Nursing Midwife (ANM), Ms. Manju trained the staff on immunization, the importance of health and nutrition for nursing mothers and in HIV-AIDS to field workers.



- Field workers were trained in screening children in the age group of 0-3 years to identify children at risk followed by early intervention training for age group of 0-6 years.
- CBR Team visited Arpana, an NGO working in the field of health, livelihood and disability based in Karnal, Haryana, to learn from its experience in organizing women's Self Help Groups to replicate that model with disabled persons as well.
- Mobility-Orientation training to build capacity of field workers to train children and persons with visual impairments.
- Workshop on Team building to build camaraderie and understanding.









HEALTH

- Provided support to the district medical board by spreading the information in the villages served by us during camps for issuing disability certificates.
- Screened all infants between 0 and 3 years for early identification of disabilities and suitable intervention.
- Worked in close association with Accredited Social Health Activists (ASHA) and Auxiliary Nursing Midwifes (ANM). Screened 846 children in 27 villages: 463 boys and 383 girls.
- Started Early Intervention groups for children between 0 to 6 years at Anganwadis. It helped in training of mothers whose children were at risk. Fourteen children are attending Anganwadis now.

EDUCATION

- Linked children with special needs to Govt Schools: 18 in primary schools, 16 linked to secondary and higher secondary schools.
- Established effective linkages with block resource teachers to address issues with regards to enrolment of children with special needs.
- Provided list of out of school children of 27 villages to the block education officer to facilitate their enrollment in government schools.









LIVELIHOOD

- Disseminated information to Persons With Disabilities (PWDs) and linked them to job-oriented vocational training courses.
- Service users from Vishwas CBR programme participated in the Job Fair hosted by Vishwas on April 26, 2012 at the division level in Gurgaon.
- Another job fair was held on March 3, 2013, in Abheypur Village organized by IF&LS with Vision of India. Awareness was spread across all villages served by Vishwas. Nine of our service users participated and were selected for skill-based training.


ENTITLEMENTS

- Facilitated disability certificates at Block level by making sure that maximum population of PWDs get their due entitlements.
- Four disability certificate camps held at Sohna government hospital and 73 disability certificates issued.
- Helped 99 persons get disability pension/widow pension/old age pension



EMPOWERMENT

■ Held interactive talks at 20 schools from 3rd to 12th December '2012, raising awareness on rights of children and persons with disabilities and importance of equal opportunities for all. Sarpanch, Teachers and elders of the villages attended and participated actively. Talks held at Damdama, Saanp ki Nagli, Abheypur, Jakkopur, Khaika, Baluda, Ghangola, Sarmathla, Dhaulha, Nunhera, Lohtki, Raipur, Berka, Lakuwaas, Siriska, Silani, Kharoda, Sohna, Sohna Dhani and Sancholi.

DULT group continued working on shopping and cooking as part of their lifeskill training. We lowered the number of trainees going for shopping in order to enhance individual learning of social skills and building self-esteem. Helped raise awarness to counter stereotypical perception of Person with disabilities.

■ Field trips to Bio Diversity Park, Leisure Valley Park to help them sharpen their interaction skills.



- Individual assessment with regards to Shopping, Cooking and Gardening completed for all trainees this year.
- Gardening added as a new activity for trainees where they prepared gardening beds, sowed seeds, watered and removed weeds. Produce from this garden was used in the cooking sessions.
- Sale of cooked items has increased substantially and students of Vishwas Vidyalaya look forward to the extra meal that they can purchase from the Adult group like Fried Rice, Poha, Upma, Sandwiches, sprouts etc.



Job Fair at Vishwas



OB Fair was hosted at VISHWAS in collaboration with Saarthak, Vocational Rehabilitation Centre (VRC), Delhi and Divisional Employment Office (DEO), Gurgaon on 26th April'2012. 153 Persons with disabilities registered for the same. 16 Companies from IT, BPO and Hospitality sector like Aegis, Ace Facility management, Bharti Walmart, Costa Coffee, Exl, Future Group, Genpact, HCL, ITC Fortune, Netambit, Sarovar Portico, Tech Mahindra, Tele performance, Chroma, Steria came for the interviews. 18 persons with disabilities were selected on the spot and 30 further were short listed.













NIIT Foundation-Career development Centre, Gurgaon at VISHWAS - Started a programme to provide skill-training and focused placement assistance to the students with physical impairment. The trainings offered are:

- IT and Personality Development to focus on basic digital skills, typing, data entry, excel, word, life skills, job etiquette, basic communication skills
- BPO skills, Basic computing skills, excel, word, life skills, job etiquette, basic communication skills with personality development

Vishwas Research and Training

ISHWAS has taken up a project in partnership with Bharti Foundation and Education Department, Haryana. An Inclusive kit is being prepared for school teachers working in Haryana primary government schools. The main objective of the kit is to increase the understanding, skills and confidence of teachers that is required to move towards inclusive practices for all their students, including those with special needs.

'Ask Us Too!'

Hearing the voices of children and young people with disabilities living in South Asia. In July 2012 Vishwas collaborated with Dr. Mary Wickenden from university College London for a qualitative study, 'Ask Us Too'. This was a 2 country pilot project; conducted in India and Sri Lanka; to find out about the lives of children and young people with disabilities by asking them about their lives and experiences and how these were different from the lives of their peers and what would make it better. We spoke to children with disabilities and conducted participatory workshops (activities and games) for young adults exploring the answers to various questions. It was an enriching experience for Vishwas as this pilot will potentially be of use in generating awareness regarding the need to invest in disability research.



VISHWAS PUBLICATION




